FACTS about the Utah State Capitol Building

- It took over two years to build at a cost of \$2,739,528.
- It was dedicated on October 9, 1916.
- It stands 404 feet long, 240 feet wide, and the copper covered dome rises 285 feet above ground level.
- The dome of the rotunda rises 165 feet above the marble floor, displaying a 6,000 pound chandelier suspended from a 95 foot, 7,000 pound chain.
- The architectural design was done by Richard K.A. Kletting blending Utah Granite and Georgia marble.
- Each of the 24 marble columns on the main floor stands 25 feet tall and weighs 25,000 pounds.
