Club History

The International Association of Lions Clubs was founded in 1917 by Melvin Jones, a Chicago businessman with a vision of joining local businesses with local residents and providing service to the local community. The idea spread and soon there were many other clubs joining with the Association.

The East Mill Creek Betterment League chose to associate with Lions in 1943. An organization meeting was held and the charter approved by Lions International on Dec 1.

The first Charter night was held on January 15, 1944.



What membership means

The central theme of this service club is service. We organize and sponsor events and activities that serve the people in our community. We promote the objectives and ideals of the International Association of Lions Clubs. Your own Lions Club experience will be exactly what you make of it.

The East Mill Creek Lions Club has three different types of meetings; Board Meetings (sometimes called Business Meetings), Membership Meetings (sometimes called Dinner Meetings), and Work Meetings.

Projects

International Projects

Since 1990, SightFirst has raised over \$500 million which is being used with the objective of eliminating curable blindness.

District Projects

The Utah Lions Eye Bank stores harvested corneas and make them available for corrective eye surgery. Leader Dogs are trained by Lions for use by the blind. Eyesight screening clinics are held state-wide.

Club Projects

Our projects are focused primarily on the needs of the East Mill Creek Community. We sponsor annual community-wide projects like the July 4th Celebration [featuring a Breakfast and Children's Parade], and the Easter Egg Hunt [for children ages 0-9]. More focused projects meet specific needs like the William J Naylor Memorial Government Education Adventure [we pay for the transportation expense to send 5th graders from public schools in our area to visit the State Capitol Building], and Share the Harvest [Funds are received and turkeys are distributed through local clergy to individuals and families who stand in need during the holiday season].
